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



























Important Information

For your safety

To prevent severe injury and loss of life/property, read this section carefully before using the product to ensure proper and safe operation of your product.

WARNING

Power connection

- Use only the power source marked on the product.
- Do not overload power outlets and extension cords. This can result in the risk of fire or electric shock.
- Completely insert the AC adaptor/power plug into the power outlet. Failure to do so may cause electric shock and/or excessive heat resulting in a fire.
- Regularly remove any dust, etc. from the AC adaptor/power plug by pulling it from the power outlet, then wiping with a dry cloth. Accumulated dust may cause an insulation defect from moisture, etc. resulting in a fire.
- Unplug the product from power outlets if it emits smoke, an abnormal smell, or makes an unusual noise. These conditions can cause fire or electric shock. Confirm that smoke has stopped emitting and contact an authorised service centre.
- Unplug from power outlets and never touch the inside of the product if its casing has been broken open.

Installation

- Do not mix old and new batteries.
- Do not open or mutilate the batteries. Released electrolyte from the batteries is corrosive and may cause burns or injury to the eyes or skin. The electrolyte is toxic and may be harmful if swallowed.
- Exercise care when handling the batteries. Do not allow conductive materials such as rings, bracelets, or keys to touch the batteries, otherwise a short circuit may cause the batteries and/or the conductive material to overheat and cause burns.
- Charge the batteries provided with or identified for use with this product only, in accordance with the instructions and limitations specified in this manual.

- away from electronic appliances such as TVs, radios, personal computers, wireless devices, or other phones.

Battery charge

Charge for about 7 hours.

Note when setting up

Note for connections

- The AC adaptor must remain connected at all times. (It is normal for the adaptor to feel warm during use.)
- The AC adaptor should be connected to a vertically oriented or floormounted AC outlet. Do not connect the AC adaptor to a ceiling-mounted AC outlet, as the weight of the adaptor may cause it to become disconnected.

During a power failure

The unit will not work during a power failure. We recommend connecting a corded-type telephone (without AC adaptor) to the same telephone line or to the same telephone line jack, if you have such a telephone jack in your house.

Note for battery installation

- Use the supplied rechargeable batteries. For replacement, we recommend using the Panasonic rechargeable batteries noted on page 4. 8.
- Wipe the battery ends (⊕, ⊝) with a dry cloth.
- Avoid touching the battery ends (\bigoplus, \bigcirc) or the unit contacts.

Note for battery charge

- It is normal for the handset to feel warm during charging.
- · Clean the charge contacts of the handset, base unit, and charger with a soft and dry cloth once a month. Clean more often if the unit is exposed to grease, dust, or high humidity.

- It is normal for batteries not to reach full capacity at the initial charge. Maximum battery performance is reached after a few complete cycles of charge/discharge (use).
- Actual battery performance depends on a combination of how often the handset is in use and how often it is not in use (standby).
- · Even after the handset is fully charged, the handset can be left on the base unit or charger without any ill effect on the batteries.
- The battery level may not be displayed correctly after you replace the batteries. In this case, place the handset on the base unit or charger and let it charge for at least 7 hours.



















Making/Answering Calls

3 [v]/[A]: "Yes" \rightarrow $[M] \rightarrow [M]$

Making calls

- 1 Lift the handset and dial the phone number.
 - To correct a digit, press
- 2 [~]
- 3 When you finish talking, press [★⊙] or place the handset on the base unit or charger.

Using the speakerphone

- **1** Dial the phone number and press [♣].
 - Speak alternately with the other party.
- When you finish talking, press [★①].

Note:

- For best performance, use the speakerphone in a quiet environment.
- To switch back to the receiver, press
 [>].

Adjusting the receiver or speaker volume

Press (▲) or (▼) repeatedly while talking.

Making a call using the redial list

The last 10 phone numbers dialled are stored in the redial list (each 24 digits max.).

- 1 (right soft key)
- 2 [▼]/[▲]: Select the desired phone number.
- 3 [~]

Erasing a number in the redial list

- 1 (right soft key)
- 2 $[\checkmark]/[\land]$: Select the desired phone number. $\rightarrow [] \rightarrow []$

Pause (for PBX/long distance service users)

A pause is sometimes required when making calls using a PBX or long distance service. When storing a calling card access number and/or PIN in the phonebook, a pause is also needed (page 21).

Example: If you need to dial the line access number "0" when making outside calls with a PBX:

- 1 $[0] \rightarrow \mathbb{P}$
- 2 Dial the phone number. \rightarrow [\rightarrow]

Note

 A 3 second pause is inserted each time is pressed. Repeat as needed to create longer pauses.

Answering calls

When a call is being received, the ringer indicator on the handset flashes.

- Lift the handset and press [ヘ] or [嗪] when the unit rings.
 - You can also answer the call by pressing any dial key from [0] to [9], [*], or [#]. (Any key answer feature)
- 2 When you finish talking, press [★⊙] or place the handset on the base unit or charger.

Auto talk

You can answer calls simply by lifting the handset off the base unit or charger. You do not need to press []. To turn this feature on, see page 22.

















Making/Answering Calls

Adjusting the handset ringer volume Press (▲) or (▼) repeatedly to select the desired volume while the handset is ringing for an incoming call.

Note:

• You can also program the handset ringer volume beforehand (page 22).

Useful features during a call

Mute

While mute is turned on, you can hear the other party, but the other party cannot hear you.

- Press during conversation.
 - 🔯 flashes.
- To return to the conversation, press again.

Recall/flash

[R/①] allows you to use the special features of your host PBX such as transferring an extension call, or accessing optional telephone services.

Note:

• To change the recall/flash time, see page 23.

For call waiting or Call Waiting Caller ID service users

To use call waiting, you must first subscribe to the call waiting service of your service provider/telephone company.

This feature allows you to receive calls while you are already talking on the phone. If you receive a call while on the phone, you will hear a call waiting tone.

If you subscribe to both Caller ID and Call Waiting with Caller ID services,

the 2nd caller's information is displayed after you hear the call waiting tone on the handset.

- Press [R/O] to answer the 2nd call.
- 2 To switch between calls, press 【R/①】.

Note:

• Please contact your service provider/telephone company for details and availability of this service in your area.

Temporary tone dialling (for rotary/pulse service users)

You can temporarily switch the dialling mode to tone when you need to access touch-tone services (for example, telephone banking services).

- Make a call.
- 2 Press (*) when prompted to enter your code or PIN, then press the appropriate dial keys.

Note:

• The dialling mode will return to pulse when you hang up.

Call share

You can join an existing outside call. To join the conversation, press [>] when the other handset is on an outside call.

• To prevent other users from joining your conversations with outside callers, turn the privacy mode on (page 23).

















Making/Answering Calls

Key lock

The handset can be locked so that no calls or settings can be made. Incoming calls can be answered, but all other functions are disabled while key lock is

To turn key lock on, press (middle soft key) for about 3 seconds.

- 🗖 is displayed.
- To turn key lock off, press (middle soft key) for about 3 seconds.

Note:

• Calls to emergency numbers cannot be made until key lock is turned off.























Phonebook

Handset phonebook

The phonebook allows you to make calls without having to dial manually. You can add 100 names and phone numbers.

Adding entries



















Character entry

Error messages
